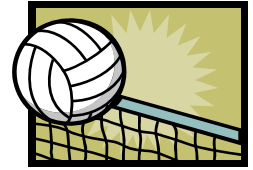

Get the Buzz on Bee stings

As summer approaches and we begin to have the occasional sunny day, we see more bees and other stinging bugs. Bees are fuzzy, yellow and black flying insects that sting when they are mad and die after they have stung a person. Hornets are dark colored wasps and Yellow Jackets are small yellow and black striped wasps. Wasps can sting more than once because they can pull their stinger in and out. A Wasp or Bee sting may look like a red raised bump that hurts like a shot at the doctor's office.

To avoid being stung wear dark colored clothing, avoid perfumes and smelly body lotions and keep your food and beverages covered while outside. If you suspect that you may have been stung, you need to contact an adult immediately.

An adult can remove any stinger that was left behind, help you to clean the area with soap and water and apply ice to the affected area. An adult can also give you a pain reliever if they feel it is necessary. Some people are allergic to bee and/or wasp stings so it is important to alert an adult immediately after being stung. Any person who has a history of allergies to Bee or Wasp stings should be prepared. Make sure you carry your medication with you or a trusted adult at all times.

While at school, make sure your allergy is known by staff and proper medication with a health plan is kept at the office. Wear a medical alert bracelet for life threatening allergies.

Taking a few simple precautions will help you be prepared for the sunny, warm weather that lies ahead.
